Friction is a force that resists the relative motion between two objects or materials. The causes of this resistive force are molecular adhesion, surface roughness, and deformations.

How to reduce friction

Using lubricants such as oil or grease can reduce the friction b/w the surfaces.

To make aerodynamic shape also reduce air friction e.g. aeroplane, rocket, Bullet etc.

Importance of salts in human

body: Salt plays a crucial role in maintaining health. It is the main source of sodium and chloride ions in the human diet.

Sodium is essential for nerve and muscle function and is involved in the regulation of fluids in the body.

Sodium also play role in the body's control of blood pressure and volume.

Salts are resources of electrolytes that aiding balance, support transfer of nerve impulses, carry nutrients to cell and secretion of gastric acid.
